




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Preparing for an Advising Appointment



Things to consider before the appointment

- Understand degree requirements of colleges and majors you are considering.
 - Review the curriculum before your appointment.
- Be aware of academic deadlines <u>here</u>
- Review course descriptions to be aware of any prerequisites and co requisites for your <u>classes</u>
- Prepare a list of questions for you and your advisor to discuss.
- Decide what your goals are as a student, i.e. what do you want to accomplish this semester?



What to do During the Advising Appointment



How to Speak to Advisors

- The Advisor's purpose is to **help** you figure out how you will complete your major(s)/minor(s) on time
- Let them know what will make you most successful as a student meaning...
 - Whether you thrive with a larger workload (higher credits, less free time) or a smaller workload (lower credits, more free time)
 - What subject areas you are genuinely interested in
- If you have any yet, let them know what your career goals are so they can guide you in building a proper schedule
- Be kind and build a friendly relationship with them!
 - Remember that they are here to help you succeed and are on your side



What to Do During the Appointment

- Take notes in a small journal for future reference.
- Be honest with your advisor it's okay if you do not know what you want to major in or what career you are interested in!
- Remember: this appointment is to help you understand what classes are available to you, which of these you are interested in taking, and how you can achieve your goals through taking them ask as many questions as you would like.



Questions You Could Ask an Advisor (1/2)

- How flexible is this major?
- What classes are required for this major (Math, foreign language, etc)?
- What skills will this major help me develop?
- How many classes should I take every semester?
- What kind of careers can I pursue with a degree in this major?
- Do you think I need to get a higher degree? What should I do to prepare for graduate study?
- Can I change my major? How?
- Should I pursue a minor area of study? What minor would be most beneficial for my career path?

Questions You Could Ask an Advisor (2/2)

- Is an internship required for this major? Would one be beneficial to me?
- What other campus resources do you suggest I utilize? If I'm struggling academically, what resources should I utilize?
- Am I on-track to graduate?
- When and how can I register for classes?
- Do you suggest taking online courses? Why or why not?
- What academic goals should I set for myself?
- What, exactly, is your role as my advisor?
- What electives do you suggest I take?
- If I have any questions, what is the best way to reach you?
- What courses do you teach?
- Do you have any advice or tips for me?
